

Shipment to Honduras

A shipment valued at \$259,723.28 was loaded at Midwest Mission and sent to Honduras through our partner, Food For the Poor, on June 29th. Items included in this shipment were: 39 electric sewing machines, over 800 air fresheners, 25,295 cloth face masks, 3,500 disposable face masks, 6 exam chairs, 50 hospital grade mattresses, 100 walkers, 103,680 face towels, 800 exam gloves, 400 disposable gowns, 280 MMDC Student Kits, and 168 MMDC Layette Kits.



Honduras is one of the poorest countries in Latin

America, where 64% of people fall under the poverty line. Many believe Honduras is one of the most vulnerable countries in the world due to the high crime rate and volatile government. 60% of households live on as little as \$3.80 a day and rely on donations and help from developed countries. Most families do not have access to clean water, medical supplies, shoes, and other items or care that we take for granted here in America. It is truly a blessing that so many people come together to help strangers in a completely different country! We hope God looks over these families and continues to help those who need it the most.

"Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work" [2 Corinthians 9:6-8]

Food For the Poor, one of the largest international relief and development organizations in the nation, does so much more than feed millions of the hungry children and families living in poverty (primarily in 17 countries of the Caribbean and Latin America). This interdenominational Christian ministry supplies emergency relief assistance, clean water, medicine, educational materials, homes, support for vulnerable children, care for the aged, micro-enterprise development assistant and skills training. 



History Speaks—by Judy Vasby, Willerup Historian FREEDOM IS NOT FREE

"When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another...." So begins our U.S. Declaration of Independence from Great Britain, proclaiming that "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness..." It then listed 29 grievances against King George III and the British legislature and ended by saying they firmly relied on "the protection of Divine Providence." It was signed by representatives from 13 colonies, who knew they would be considered traitors and could be hanged. Yet they signed it on July 4, 1776. And then they had to fight to gain "our" independence. The war only formally came to an end when the Treaty of Paris was signed on September 4, 1783.



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Next came the U.S. Constitution, the basic rules by which we are governed. It was through the summer of 1787 that delegates to a Federal Convention met in Philadelphia to construct a framework for a national government that could encompass not only the needs of the original 13 states, but also accommodate the anticipated expansion to the West. The Constitution was signed on September 17, 1787. The Bill of Rights soon followed (December 15, 1791) to add 10 freedoms that states requested, such as Amendment I – "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of

religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridge the freedom of speech or of the press..." Since then, 17 more Amendments have been added, among them — "the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude" (#15), ...nor on account of sex (#19). Our country and its laws were based on Biblical values.

I cannot help but think about the Israelites after they were led out of Egypt by Moses under God's direction. They were going to the land God had promised them. It was a land "flowing with milk and honey." But they had to <u>fight</u> for it, first to conquer the people who lived there, whose lives were not pleasing to God, and second, to maintain the right to worship God and to follow His laws. But over time, both their kings and religious leaders turned from God and chose to run things their own way. Eventually, God had enough and let the Israelites be conquered and taken to captivity. Too late they realized that they had had true freedom by yielding to God and obeying His precepts.

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The United States also began as a promised land in its own way. Most of the men who wrote our founding documents had a large measure of faith in God, knowledge of the philosophies of the times, and an understanding of scripture. They were inspired to create a form of government that had never been tried before one in which the people, not kings or aristocrats or the military, made the decisions.

Through the years we have struggled with what is right and fair and with giving minority groups equal access and protection. But the reason for the struggle has been the general acceptance that God brought our nation into being and is leading us along. However, like the Israelites, we need to stay vigilant to our own behaviors and to people or groups who are trying to bring us down. We have to accept personal responsibility, to actively participate in making decisions about how we are governed, and to stay in touch with God for this grand experiment to work- "one nation, under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all."

And as with the Israelites we must understand that the freedoms we enjoy are not free. There was and is a cost, and sometimes war is declared. Willerup Methodist Church was incorporated in 1851, and members of the congregation have participated in most of the wars since then. I am not going to comment on the merits of individual wars, nor the lack thereof, just on the service and sacrifices of men and families through decades who took responsibility to maintain our freedom.

Civil War (1861-65)

It is of interest that Wisconsin had the only all-Scandinavian regiment in the Union Army. The "15th Wisconsin" was made up of mostly Norwegians, with some soldiers from Denmark and Sweden. It was led by Col. Hans Christian Heg, whose family came to the U.S. from Norway in 1840. He organized the



unit by making an appeal to all young "Norsemen," saying that it was their duty as "brave and intelligent citizens to extend their hands in the cause of our Country." He led this regiment and then a larger brigade in several battles. He was shot and died in the Battle of Chickamauga in 1863.

Statue of Col. Hans Christian Heg

Col. Heg abhorred slavery and gave his life to see it banished. A statue was erected in his honor on the Wisconsin Capitol grounds in 1926. In June 2020 during a Black Lives Matter protest, individuals pulled the statue down, decapitated it, and threw it into Lake Monona. The State Capitol and Executive Residence Board (SCERB) has since voted unanimously to restore the statue.

According to the Village of Cambridge history, a number of men from Cambridge served in the **Civil War**. The following are buried in our church cemetery: Lewis Knudson & Gunner Thorson- died in the war; Gustave Madson, John Halvorson, & Thomas Nelson- served, but not killed.


